

# Thurman Cemeteries to Explore

## 1. Reynolds

On Valley Rd, about a 1/2 mile south of William J. Baker Rd, visible from the road.

## 2. Thurman Baptist

On Valley Rd, past Reynolds Cemetery, about a 1/2 mile north of Garnet Lake Road S, visible from the road.

## 3. Russell Family

Off Henry Westcott Rd, south of the intersection with Garnet Lake Rd S, down in the woods, not visible from the road.

## 4. Baker

On Mountain Rd, between Lauben Way and Bear Pond Rd, visible from the road.

## 5. Wilsey

On the north side of Frost St, near the intersection with Glen Athol Rd, visible from the road.

On River Rd, north of Mosher Lane, about midway between the Thurman Station and The Glen, visible from the road.

## 7. Athol Village

On the north side of Athol Rd, visible from the road.

## 8. Mosher

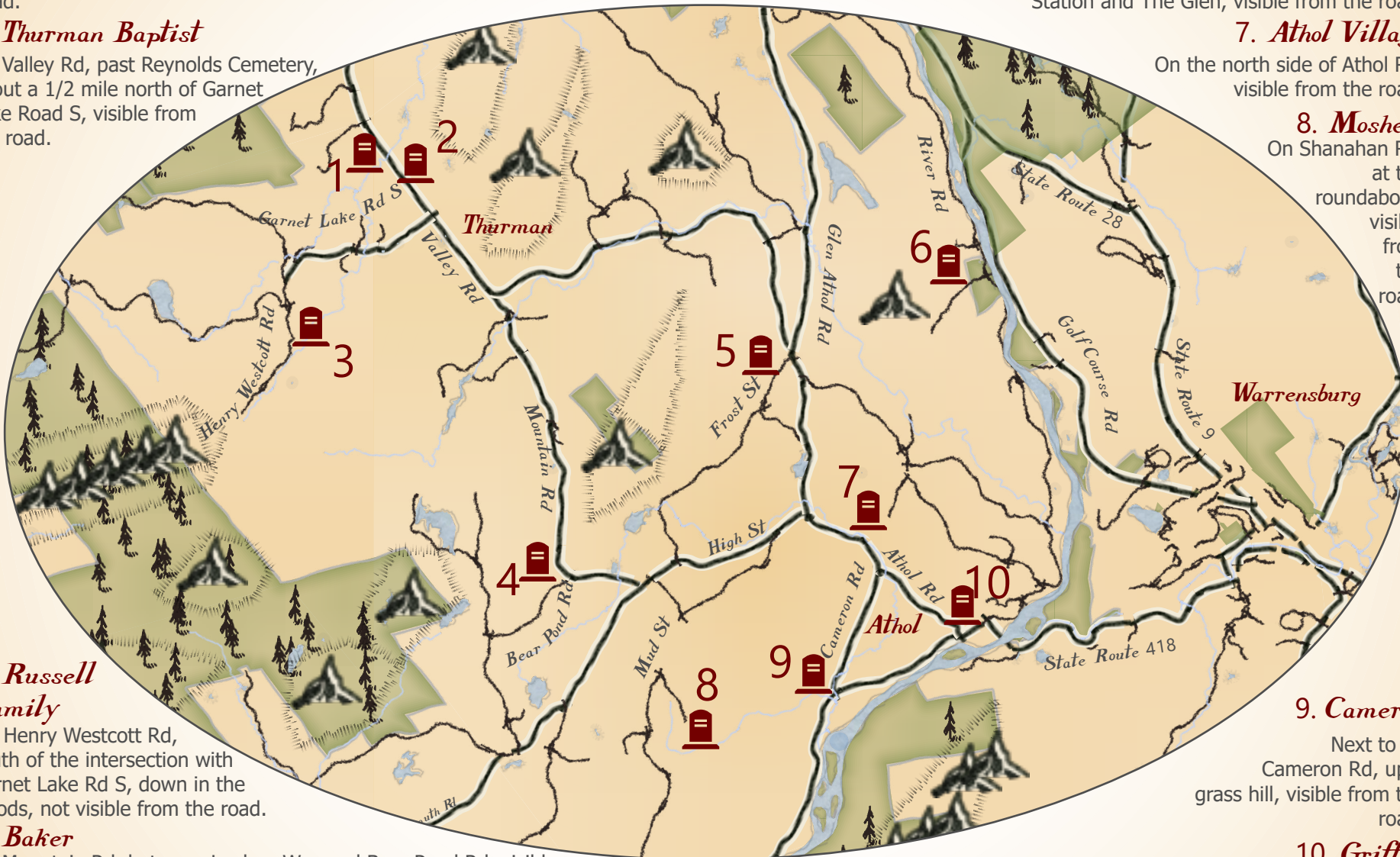
On Shanahan Rd, at the roundabout, visible from the road.

## 9. Cameron

Next to 40 Cameron Rd, up a grass hill, visible from the road.

## 10. Griffen

On private property, visible from the road, about 1/4 of a mile north of the intersection with State Route 418, not accessible.



# Thurman History

## 1. Thurman Station

On State Route 418, just when you cross over the Hudson from Warrensburg.

The original Thurman Station was built as a combination passenger and freight

station in 1870. It was removed in 1933 and replaced with a small shelter in the early 1950s. The rail line was shut down completely in 1989. In the 1990's, Warren County obtained grants to purchase and rehabilitate the tracks and build stations. The "new" and current Thurman Station was completed in 2009.

## 2. James Cameron

The marker is located on Stony Creek Rd, about a 1/2 mile from the Stony Creek town line. James Cameron was among a group of Scottish immigrants who came in 1773. The

Cameron family settled here on the property along the river. He was a farmer who used cascading streams to power mills for sawing wood and grinding grain. The Cameron family still reside in Thurman.
