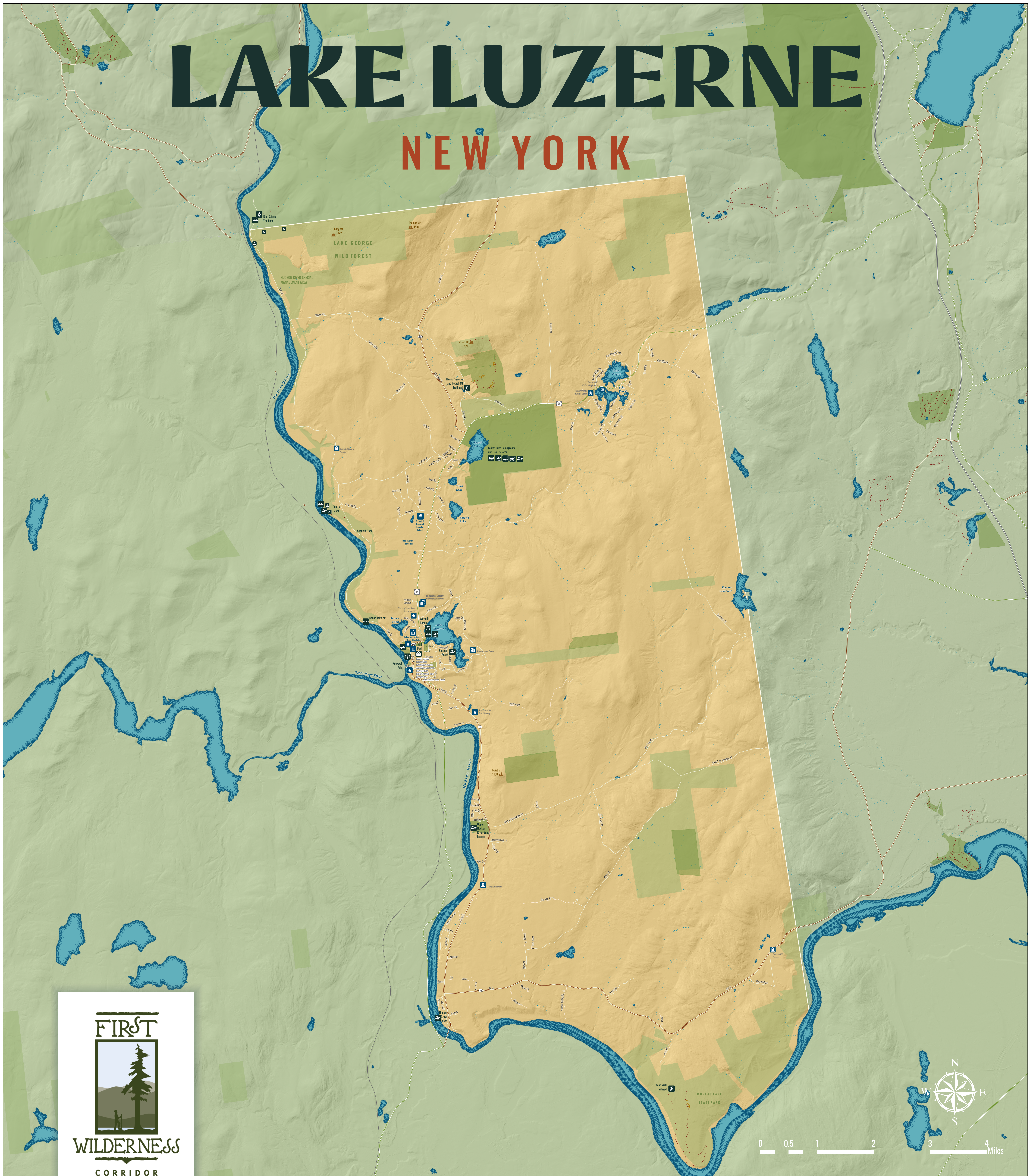

With roots in a 4,100-acre land grant awarded to Edward and Ebenezer Jessup in 1767, the town we know today as Lake Luzerne was named in 1808 to honor Chevalier de la Luzerne, a French nobleman who aided the colonists in their fight against the British. Lumbering was the first industry, then came mills, a distillery, the Garner Leather tannery, and Albrecht Pagenstacher's innovative paper mill, which would evolve into International Paper. Dude Ranches became the rage in the years before World War II and several are still going strong, including the 'Double H Hole in the Woods Ranch' for critically ill children.
