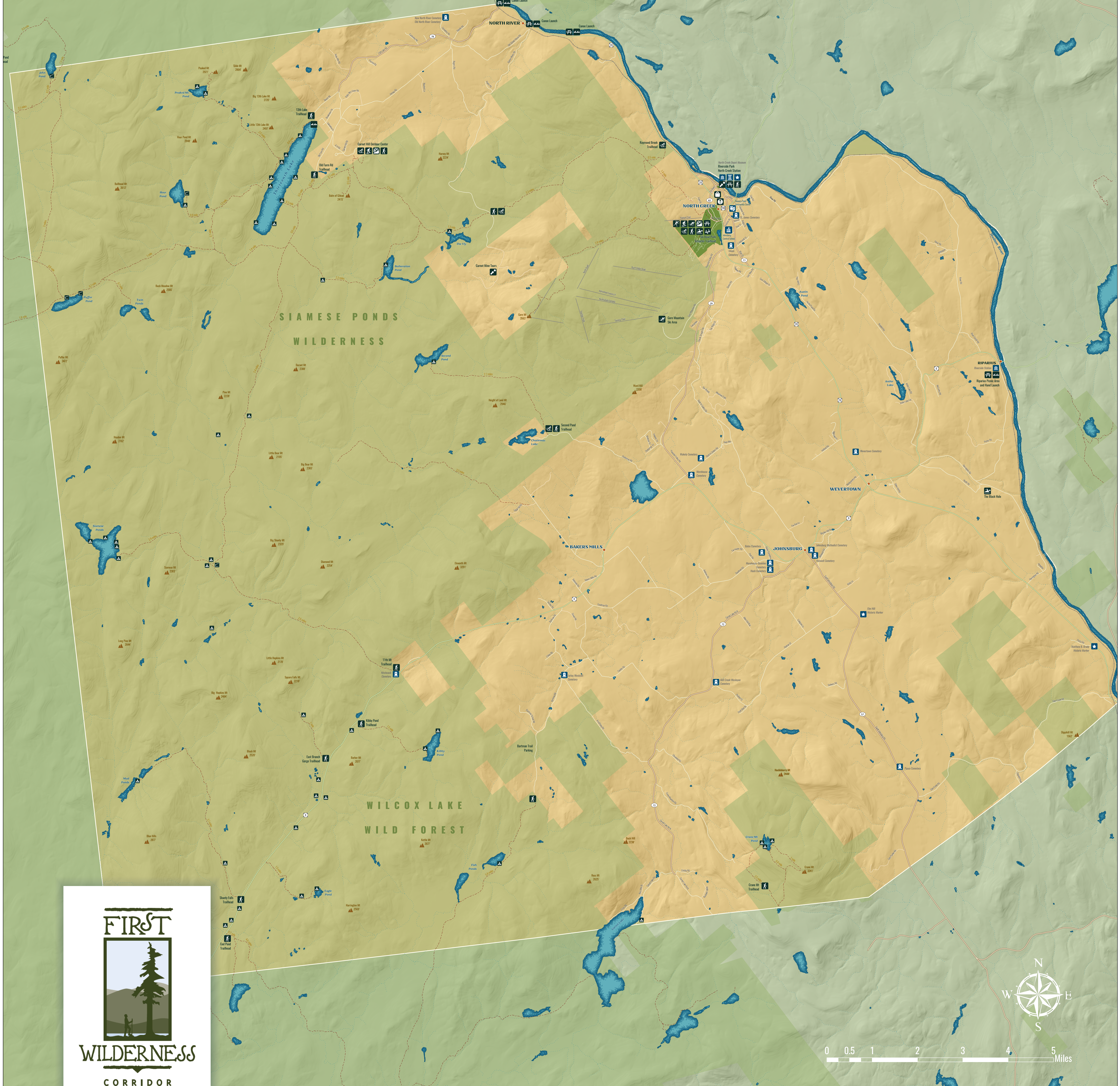

Warren County's largest town by area, Johnsburg was partitioned from the original Town of Thurman in 1805. Like Thurman, it's named for John Thurman, the wealthy merchant from New York City who acquired 25,200 acres of the Totten and Crossfield Purchase in 1788. Thurman made his home at Elm Hill, south of the current hamlet of Johnsburg. His "forest citadel" included mills, a distillery, a woolen factory, a cotton factory, a pot ash works, and a calico printing works, perhaps the first in America. The hamlet of North Creek served as the terminus of the Adirondack Railroad.
