***Note: As per Governor Cuomo's Executive Order 202.1: "Article 7 of the Public Officers Law, to the extent necessary to permit any public body to meet and take such actions authorized by the law without permitting in public in-person access to meetings and authorizing such meetings to be held remotely by conference call or similar service, provided that the public has the ability to view or listen to such proceeding and that such meetings are recorded and later transcribed". All committee members participated by video or teleconference, aside from Supervisors Merlino and Simpson, who were physically present.***

In the absence of Committee Chair Braymer, Supervisor Dickinson, as Vice-Chair, called the meeting of Environmental Concerns & Real Property Tax Services to order at 1:23 p.m.

Copies of the Real Property Tax Services and Environmental Concerns meeting agendas were distributed to those present; those participating remotely accessed the agenda via the Warren County website. *Copies of the agendas are on file with the meeting minutes.*

Commencing review of the Real Property Tax Services agenda, privilege of the floor was extended to Lexie Delurey, *Director, Real Property Tax Services*, who addressed the Information for Discussion/Review section of the agenda, she provided an update on the Mullen's property located on Bay Road in the Town of Queensbury, stating the deed had been recorded on October 27<sup>th</sup> and a notice to proceed had been sent to the contracting company on November 16<sup>th</sup> for a start date of November 25<sup>th</sup> and a mandatory completion date of December 25<sup>th</sup>.

Mr. Merlino entered the meeting at 1:25 p.m.

Next, Ms. Delurey apprised Ms. Braymer had requested she inquire if the Committee would be interested in sending a letter in support of an Executive Order to suspend the requirement to renew the senior citizens age and disability exemption for one year by local option. She said she felt a member of the Warren County Assessors Association could better speak on behalf of her about the matter and she introduced Lori Barber, *Assessor, Town of Lake George*, who explained a letter of support would enable

seniors to avoid renewing in person and allow renewal by phone.

A motion was made by Mr. Strough, seconded by Mr. Beaty and carried unanimously to authorize a letter in support of an Executive Order to suspend the requirement to renew the senior citizens age and disability exemption for one year and the necessary resolution was authorized for the December 18<sup>th</sup> Board meeting.

Moving on to the Environmental Concerns agenda, the Committee entertained a request to re-appoint the Climate Smart Coordinator, as well as the members of the Warren County Climate Smart Task Force, for a one-year term.

Motion was made by Ms. Hogan, seconded by Mr. Simpson and carried unanimously to approve the request and the necessary resolution was authorized for the December 18<sup>th</sup> Board meeting. *A copy of the resolution request form is on file with the minutes.*

Continuing with the Items for Discussion portion of the agenda, privilege of the floor was extended to Chris Belden, *Assistant County Planner*, who provided a brief overview of the 2019 Energy Benchmarking Report included in the agenda packet.

Mr. Belden then apprised a grant application had been submitted in cooperation with Kevin Hajos, *Superintendent of Public Works*, to New York State Department of Environmental Conservation in October for County promotion of recycling and he gave a brief description of what the program would entail.

Before concluding the meeting, Mr. Dickinson asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the previous Environmental Concerns & Real Property Tax Services Committee meeting, subject to correction by the Clerk of the Board. The motion was made by Mr. Simpson, seconded by Mr. Beaty, and carried unanimously.

There being no further business to come before the Environmental Concerns & Real Property Tax Services Committee, on motion made by Mr. Beaty, seconded by Mr. Simpson and carried unanimously, Mr. Dickinson adjourned the meeting at 1:43 p.m.

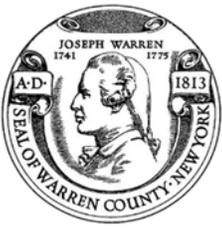

# Warren County Climate Smart Task Force



## Climate Smart Task Force

The Warren County Climate Smart Task Force was established in 2019 to assist with developing strategies that curb greenhouse gas emissions and adapt to the impacts of global climate change. In 2020, Warren County earned the designation of Certified Bronze Climate Smart Community (CSC), by New York State.

For 2021, we recommend reducing the size of the Task Force and establishing advisory members. Appointments are made for a term of one (1) year.

## Climate Smart Coordinator

The Climate Smart Coordinator is responsible for the management and outreach for the County's CSC Program. Chris Belden, AICP, Assistant County Planner, has served as the Coordinator since establishing the program. We recommend his reappointment to that role for 2021.

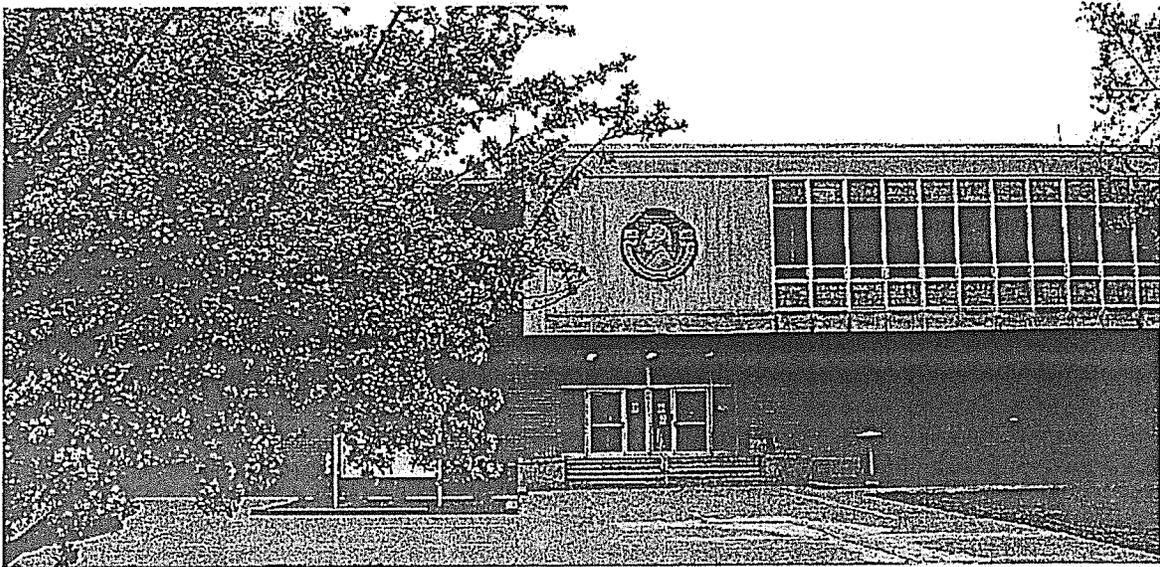

## Warren County | Building Energy Benchmarking Program

In 2019, the Warren County Planning Department established the County's Climate Smart Communities Program. In the spring of 2020, Warren County earned the designation of Certified-Bronze Climate Smart Community – based on actions taken in Warren County to mitigate the causes and impacts of global climate change.



One such action taken by Warren County Board of Supervisors was the adoption of Resolution 552 of 2019. This resolution established a County Building Energy Benchmarking Policy ("Policy").

The Policy requires the collection, report, and sharing of building energy data for buildings (over 1,000 square feet) owned or occupied by Warren County.

## Disclosure and Publication of Benchmarking Information

The submission of this report shall satisfy the requirement of Section 4 of our Building Energy Benchmarking Policy. Pursuant to the requirements in this policy, the following information (if available) must be included in this report:

1. Summary statistics on Energy consumption for Covered Municipal Buildings derived from aggregation of Benchmarking Information; and
2. For each Covered Municipal Building individually:
  - a. The status of compliance with the requirements of this Policy; and
  - b. The building address, primary use type, and gross floor area; and
  - c. Annual summary statistics, including site EUI, Weather Normalized Source EUI, annual GHG emissions, and an Energy Performance Score where available; and
  - d. A comparison of the annual summary statistics across calendar years for all years since annual reporting under this Policy has been required for said building.

This is the first year of the benchmarking program. Therefore, information relating to item 2(d) above (annual summary comparison), is not included in this report. Additionally, information relating to the Energy Performance Score was not available.

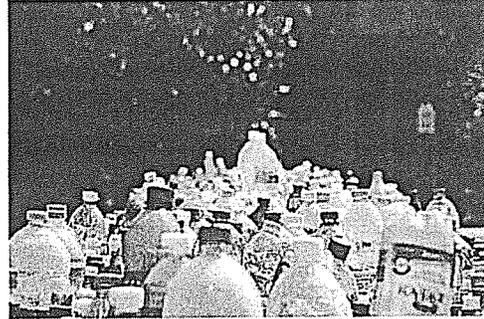
**Project Title:** Warren County Recycling Initiative

1. *DIY Backyard Composting Workshops (\$5,000)*  
Warren County Soil and Water Conservation District will conduct two (2) public workshops on how to compost food scraps to reduce the volume of organic matter in our MSW.

2. *Waste Reduction Promotion - Social Media and Printed Outreach Material (\$8,500)*  
Procure a design/marketing firm to develop 18 social media posts (2 posts/month for 9 months) and “boost” the posts on social media to reach residents of Warren County.

Develop printed recycling outreach materials (e.g. fliers, posters, postcards) for distribution at transfer stations, schools, public events.

3. *Multi-Community “Waste Wizard” Tool (\$4,500)*  
Warren County will work with its IT Department to create a page on the County website dedicated to information about solid waste, composting, and recycling. On that webpage, we will embed a “Waste Wizard”, developed by ReCollect. The company will work with Warren County and the local transfer station operators to identify how residents/businesses can dispose, recycle, compost items. The tool allows users to enter an item, (e.g. milk jug) and it would tell them how and where to dispose of it. The goal with this resource is to improve awareness of recycling opportunities and reduce “aspirational recycling” among single-stream users. Examples include Tompkins County and Madison County. Note: ReCollect is on the Sourcewell Contract, which will streamline procurement.

4. *Install Recycling Containers at Municipal Center (\$2,000)*  
Improve recycling at the Warren County Municipal Center through the purchase and distribution of recycling containers.

**Consistency with Draft Local Solid Waste Management Plan (LSWMP):**

The proposed application would address four (4) priority recommendations in the Draft LSWMP (p.69)

"Summary of Recommendations Regarding Recycling Solid Waste in the Planning Unit:

1. Create website that informs businesses, residents and institutions about composting opportunities.
2. Distribute brochures at municipal buildings and local transfer station/recycling centers that educate residents on simple and cost-effective backyard composting opportunities.
6. Develop and/or enhance recycling programs located within municipal buildings.
9. Hold seminars for local businesses to educate them on current and feasible recycling activities."

Dear Governor Cuomo,

Real Property Tax Law, Section 467, gives local governments and public school districts the option of granting a reduction in the amount of property taxes paid by qualifying senior citizens. To qualify, seniors must be 65 years of age or older and meet certain income limitations and other requirements. Local governments and school districts in New York State can also opt to grant a reduction on the amount of property taxes paid by qualifying persons with disabilities pursuant to Real Property Tax Law, Section 459(c). To qualify, persons with disabilities generally must have certain documented evidence of their disability and meet certain income limitations and other requirements.

Eligible property owners must timely file an annual renewal application in the assessor's office to continue the exemption. The time to file a renewal application is now. To protect the most vulnerable populations, persons 65 years of age and older and persons with disabilities, the New York State Assessors Association (NYSAA) is respectfully requesting the Governor take action. It is especially important to protect the people at increased risk of severe illness from Covid-19. The best way to protect this population is to limit their interactions with other people as much as possible.

Let's eliminate the need for these people to come to local municipal offices to renew their exemptions. NYSAA supports an Executive Order to suspend the requirement to renew the senior citizens age and disability exemptions for one year by local option.

NYSAA supports a coordinated approach to ensure public health and the safety of New York State's property owners.
