Comments:

Salaries: (please see previous page) overall are \$104,621.31 or 20.76% below 2021 as of the 2/27/22 payroll. Salaries for 2022 are 9.93% of the budget YTD while was 17.13% of budget for 2021. As stated, due to COVID activities, Per Diem and Part Time staff were being utilized in 2021 by the Public Health Department to continue with COVID clinics and contact tracing. We have seen a significant decrease in both Part time and Overtime salary expenses due to the State taking over much of the contact tracing, later in January 2022. However, our Public Health staff still need to be utilized for issues that need to be addressed and followed up by our Contact Tracers, Staff for Covid Clinics and others as needed by our Public Health Department.

Equipment: No purchases as of 3/10/22.

Contractual Expenses: These remain below 2021. For 2021 we still need to show the Preschool and Early Intervention Program Expenses/Accruals along with the final WIC food voucher information. They are usually received by April.

Employee Benefits: Employee benefits remain slightly under 2021 due to savings in salaries within programs and utilizing less per diem and overtime expenses.

Revenues: Revenues reflect the YTD billings for 2022 vs 2021. Both years reflect January billing. However, January of 2021 was much higher by about \$86,000 due to more referrals and nursing staff was larger therefore able to see more patients. Referrals are starting to pick up again , however staffing is still an issue.

Breakout D: Reducing the Risk of Dementia by Addressing Social Determinants of Health

Healthy Aging

With nearly 14 million Americans currently projected to have Alzheimer's in 2060, it is imperative that the public health community address the individually-modifiable risk factors associated with cognitive decline and dementia. Such an effort, however, is complicated by social determinants of health (SDOH). Some dementia-related SDOH directly increases the risk for dementia. Other SDOH are barriers to successfully addressing the modifiable risk factors. What is the current state of the science on dementia-related SDOH? And what can public health do about it? This session will review the year-long effort of the Public Health Center of Excellence on Dementia Risk Reduction to synthesize the science and translate the science into public health action. This session will particularly focus on the preliminary findings of the scientific review.

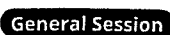

Breakout J: Disparities in Access to Obesity Management Among African American Men

Social Determinants of Health

African American men experience among the highest prevalence of obesity and obesity-related chronic diseases. Despite improved healthcare coverage, there is very low utilization of evidence-based weight-management services in this population. Identifying barriers to care utilization is essential to develop effective strategies to improve health outcomes and reduce related economic burden. We will inform on practice-based experiences on utilization of weight management and discuss the unique challenges among African American men. We will include insights from our multi-disciplinary team of healthcare providers, public health experts, community partners, and patients involved in past and ongoing studies in this population in Western New York to help in developing targeted interventions to address the identified barriers to utilization of weight management.

Mental Health

To address the lack of culturally responsive mental health programs for people of color, Beyond the Stigma aims to engage, connect, and understand youth and their families' lived experiences and barriers to optimal mental health and wellness. To understand young people's lived experiences, a series of key informant interviews and listening sessions with local community stakeholders were held. Findings from this community-based needs assessment informed the co-creation of a culturally tailored MHPSS curriculum that was facilitated by a peer-to-peer training model and community health education workshops. The presentation will provide an overview of the program, highlight best practices and lessons learned that can be replicated in other communities to better understand and respond to mental health and wellness-related needs.
