According to salary.com, those with an associate degree working as accountants earn a salary between \$57,810 and \$61,002 a year.



The median pay for substance abuse counselors is \$49,710. *Need is particularly high in New York state, where more than 1.9 million people battle substance abuse.*



Matt Ryan lived in Florida when the opioid epidemic took hold, and as he witnessed the chaos around him unfold, he realized substance abuse isn't a siloed issue.

"Criminal justice, substance abuse and mental health are looked at as separate issues, but really it's one issue intertwined," said Ryan, who searched online for degree programs in New York state and found SUNY Adirondack's Criminal Justice: Substance Abuse Services (CRSA).

In the time since, he worked first as a case manager, then program coordinator and director, creating programming, writing requests for proposals, securing funding and collaborating with law enforcement agencies on ways to reduce recidivism.

"I love direct care, but my true passion is creating programs, policies and initiatives, working toward the ultimate goal of reaching and serving the most people," he said.

Avonlea Stiles was struggling and overwhelmed her senior year of high school, so she quit.

The Ballston Spa native worked for a few years, then earned a TASC (Test Assessing Secondary Completion), attended a virtual open house event at SUNY Adirondack and enrolled in classes.

The first-generation college student worked, commuted from her family home, earned several special academic and service awards, and had eight works included in SUNY Adirondack's annual literary magazine.

Despite those considerable accomplishments, what she's most proud of isn't reflected in her GPA or literary accolades. "My brother is also a dropout and he said, 'I saw you go through the GED,' so he at least wants to do that," Stiles said. "And my little sister has been wanting to go to college since I mentioned I was going."

After graduating, Stiles took a job at Washington-Saratoga-Warren-Hamilton-Essex BOCES as a teaching assistant.





"I was a young kid who didn't take anything seriously," said the father of three.

He worked in sales for many years, then started a property management business that today has between six and 10 employees.

"For the longest time, not having a degree was one of those regrets," McGourty said. "I knew I shouldn't have dropped out when I did."

By the time he was in his mid-30s, he knew he wanted to earn a degree.

"I was turning 38 and just a victim of being a young kid of a teen mom, from a bit of a dysfunctional family where setting goals and achieving them wasn't talked about," the Cybersecurity graduate said. **"Having kids, I realized this isn't something I want to talk about that way. Now they get to see their dad working hard and making time to be a dad, to own a business and making time for school."**



When Rocco de Gregory graduated from high school, he enrolled at SUNY Adirondack and, within two semesters, decided college wasn't for him.

"Like a lot of kids, in my head, I wasn't prepared," he explained. Four years later, he enrolled again. He signed up for an introduction to archaeology class with Valerie Haskins, a professor of anthropology/archaeology. That's all it took: de Gregory was hooked.

"For the next two and a half years, I took all anthropology classes, went on international trips to Peru and Bolivia; it was the first time I left the States," he said.

Without realizing it, anthropology was the career he wanted much of his life. **He went on to earn bachelor's and master's degrees, and today works as coordinating director of Tennessee Valley Archaeological Research in Huntsville, Alabama.**

"It's all because Val gave me the experience and made me realize, 'You can do this,'" he said.



Greg Agresta spent a lot of time on the road — sometimes driving 1,500 miles a week — so when his job in HVAC repair fizzled out, he knew it was time for a change.

A free career training program at SUNY Adirondack gave him the opportunity he was looking for.

“I was unemployed at the time and I needed something mechanical,” said Agresta, of Glens Falls, who completed the college’s Workforce Readiness Academies Program (WRAP) Electrical Maintenance Technician course.

“I had a little experience here and there, but the class got me more into critical thinking, and reinforced a lot of my experience,” said Agresta, who secured a job at Albany Water Purification.

“I like what I’m doing, I’m busy, learning different things and able to apply other things I’ve done,” he said.



DID YOU KNOW?

Half the credits required for SUNY Adirondack’s Liberal Arts Math & Science degree can be earned online.

Our 1+1 programs are offered in partnership with SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry, in which the first year of an associate degree program is completed at SUNY Adirondack and the second at ESF.

Mechatronics graduates go on to become electronics, electrical, industrial engineering and manufacturing technicians; industrial machinery mechanics; and maintenance and repair specialists.

SUNY Adirondack has partnerships with Clarkson University and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institution in which high-performing Engineering students at SUNY Adirondack are **eligible for \$15,000 to \$20,000 annual scholarships** to transfer to those elite universities.
