





Additional Youth Programming

- 7 youth participated in a mentorship program for 12 weeks during the fall and winter
- Year-Round Work Experience provided more long-term placements for youth and young adults
- Virtual reality job exposure increased outreach to new groups
- HS job fairs & Career Exposure, Growing Career & Technical Education at school districts



Challenges

- Greatest barriers to employment continue to be: housing, transportation, child care, mental health, criminal records, skill deficits, demographics, technology gaps
- Vulnerable populations: veterans, seniors, youth, justice-involved, in recovery from addiction, people with disabilities: each have own challenges
- Retention and workplace culture
- Gov bureaucracy and program audits
- Grant restrictions
- Different fiscal years
- Uncertainty of federal funding and future grants
